1. Introduction by the Head Teacher

"I am prepared to go anywhere, as long as it be forward." Dr. David Livingstone

Our school is named after the famous explorer and medical missionary David Livingstone. He was born into a working class family in Blantyre on 19th March 1813. Although he lived in very humble surroundings, he worked hard to achieve his aspirations of becoming well educated. In our school we also place a great emphasis on using education to inspire and motivate our children to achieve their goals. Therefore, providing quality academic, social, emotional and behavioural education is one of the main aims of our school in enabling our children to move forward.

In David Livingstone Memorial Primary School we believe that both children and adults should be lifelong learners. One of the ways we hope to achieve successful learning is by creating a safe environment where all are respected members of our school community. The school provides the children with opportunities to participate responsibly in decision-making, to take on leadership roles, as well as to offer friendship and support to others as part of our school community. They are encouraged to contribute to the life and work of the school and, from the earliest stages, to be given the opportunity to express their ideas, views and opinions.

It is very important to us that we foster open, positive and supportive relationships in which children are given a voice and that they feel they are being heard. We value every child's right to be treated with respect, but we also emphasise to the children that they have the responsibilities to treat other with the same respect. We are all aware within the school of the need to be sensitive and responsive to each child's wellbeing. By modelling good behaviour we hope to promote effective learning and wellbeing within the school.

We believe it is important for all the children to be confident in both their academic abilities and their social skills to make the right choices both in and outside school. We want them to value their learning, to acquire skills and knowledge, to solve problems and to use their learning to explore the world around them. In the school we are constantly seeking opportunities for them to participate in modern, relevant, enterprising and enjoyable events and activities to give all children a broad curriculum.

The role of our school is to inspire our children to emulate David Livingstone and become successful learners, confident individuals, effective contributors and responsible citizens.

Our Local Authority - South Lanarkshire Council

South Lanarkshire Council is the fifth largest authority in Scotland. It covers the following main areas; Clydesdale in the south which features extensive rural areas, Cambuslang, Rutherglen, Blantyre and Uddingston to the north as well as the towns of East Kilbride and Hamilton.

The Council's Plan Connect sets out the Council's vision which is, "to improve the quality of life for all within South Lanarkshire".

For Education Resources this means delivering services of the highest quality as well as striving to narrow the gap. It is about continually improving the services for everyone at the same time as giving priority to children, young people, families and communities in most need. The priorities for schools and services are set out in the Education Resources Plan which confirms the commitment to provide better learning opportunities and outcomes for children and young people.



2. COVID-19 – Keeping children, young people, and staff safe

At the time of writing this guidance for the Handbook the Scottish Government and Public Heath guidance still applies to schools and educational settings until further notice.

On the 19 October 2021 the Scottish Government announced that the existing COVID-19 safety mitigations in schools and educational settings are to remain for now, following the advice from senior clinicians. It is worth noting that whilst for the general public a number of areas have changed in light of the roll-out of the vaccination programme, there continues to be restrictions in place for schools and educational settings. The public health message is that the safety of children and young people and all education staff, remains the overriding priority. Secondary aged pupils are expected to wear face-coverings and to undertake twice weekly lateral flow tests.

Our main focus remains on learning, teaching and the health and well-being of all learners. Schools/nurseries are adapting their ways of working and outdoor events can now take place without the restrictions that apply indoor. The infection control procedures in our schools such as, hand sanitisation when you arrive and leave, and by washing hands regularly has helped to mitigate against the spread of the virus as has the NHS roll-out of the vaccine to those who are eligible.

If there is a positive case involving a child and/or member of staff at the school then we will let you know by providing you with letter from NHSL Public Health which lets you know what you need to do.

So it is worth noting: -

There are still restrictions on who can visit schools, including parents/carers. In effect, parents/carers are not able to attend events that take place during the day in a school/nursery. Where virtual arrangements for parental meetings are already in place and working well, then these should continue to be used.

Assemblies and large gatherings are still not permissible under the current guidance. Schools are therefore asked to consider group sizes as bringing large groups together in educational settings is not advisable.

Community Lets are allowed out with the school day in line with COVID-19 guidance. If there is an intention to organise events in the evening by a parent group, they are required to make any booking through the community letting procedures as normal. A risk assessment must be undertaken in advance. This is to take account of the mitigations that require to be taken in what will be a confined space, the need for clear access and egress routes, the wearing of face coverings and infection controls, like hand sanitisation.

If a parent group is planning to host an activity then they are asked to be mindful that current restrictions at present still do not enable parents/carers to meet in a large gathering on school premises during the day.

COVID-related mitigations remain under regular review, and the Advisory Sub-Group on Education and Children's Issues and the COVID-19 Education Recovery Group (CERG) continue to work with Ministers to ensure mitigations in schools and educational settings are proportionate and appropriate.

Our school building

Our school is situated in the Coatshill area of Blantyre. The catchment area incorporates a mix of private and local authority housing.

David Livingstone Memorial Primary School is a non-denominational establishment covering stages Primary 1 – 7 and provides equal opportunities for all pupils.

Within our school we also have a nursery class. For more information about the nursery, please ask us for a Nursery Handbook.

We moved into our new, purpose-built school building in June 2012. The school has 12 classrooms (including the nursery) on one level, an ICT area, a gymnasium, a separate dining hall and one general purpose area.

The school is fully compliant with legislation relating to accessibility. We have a wet room, disabled toilets and a stair lift to allow access to the stage.

The building is modern, with up-to-date facilities throughout. These include the following:

- interactive whiteboards in all classrooms
- wireless network that allows the use of laptops and hand-held devices in all areas
- bright, modern classroom spaces
- flexible 'break out' zones
- a stage with full lighting and sound equipment
- access to outdoor spaces from every class
- landscaped playground space
- a MUGA (Multi Use Games Area) pitch area

Our Learning Community

David Livingstone Memorial Primary is part of the Calderside Learning Community. A Learning Community is made up of schools and education establishments from the area including the secondary school, primary schools, early years establishments, early years partners and schools and bases which provide specialist additional support services. It is about working together to plan better outcomes for children and young people.

The Learning Community develops ways of working between establishments and with other agencies and organisations to ensure services are responsive, accessible and are delivered as effectively as possible.

Each Learning Community is managed by a Head of Education (Area). Our Head of Education is Mr Stewart Nicolson. Each school also has a Quality Improvement Officer who is based at South Lanarkshire Headquarters in Hamilton. Attendance at school

It is important for the school to work with parents/carers in encouraging all children to attend school. By law, all absences from school are required to be recorded. Absences will normally fall under two categories – authorised or unauthorised absence. In cases where your child is unable to attend school parents/carers are asked to comply with the following:

- If you know in advance of any reason why your child is likely to be absent from school, please telephone us or let us know in writing. This might include, for example, dental or hospital appointments. Please also give your child a note on his/her return to school, outlining the reason for absence.
- Please notify the school first thing in the morning if your child is going to be absent. (The school office has an answer machine where you can leave a message if there is no one available to speak to you on the phone). We also ask that you let the school know the likely date of return and keep us informed if this date changes.
- Requests for your child to be absent from school due to family circumstances must be
 made in writing to the Head Teacher, detailing the reason, destination and duration of
 absence. Depending on the reasons for your child's absence, on these occasions he/she
 will be marked as either an authorised or an unauthorised absentee in the register.
- As we may need to contact you should your child become unwell during the school day, please keep the school informed of any changes to your home telephone number, mobile telephone number, address and emergency contact details.



For absences relating to holidays during term time, please see Section 12 of this handbook.

Dealing with concerns

We are keen to promote a positive relationship with all our parents/carers so if you have an enquiry or a concern about your child, please do not hesitate to contact the school. Your child's class teacher may be able to help in the first instance; however, if your concern is of a more serious nature, you may wish to speak to the Head Teacher.



Visitors to our school

In line with Covid-19 restrictions, we have to limit the number of visitors that we have to our school, with any visitors being restricted to people who support children's learning or wellbeing. All visitors are expected to follow the Covid-19 mitigations that we have in school. Should you wish to visit the school, please contact the Head Teacher so that appropriate arrangements can be put in place.



Parking / traffic

We encourage all children and parents to walk to school if possible. This promotes a healthy lifestyle. However, if you are using a car to bring your child to school, please park in the designated bays, or in the car park opposite. Disabled permits must be displayed in reserved spaces.

Please do not obstruct local residents' driveways or park in such a way as to obstruct traffic flow.

Please also note that the 'drop off zone' at the front of the building is not to be used for parking.



Complaints procedure

Should you have a concern/complaint about any aspect of your child's educational experience, please let us know. Complaints will be treated seriously and will be dealt with speedily and sensitively. In most cases complaints will be dealt with immediately, but certainly within 3 working days. Should a complaint require further detailed investigation, the process may take longer.

5. School Ethos

David Livingstone Memorial Primary School is a bright and modern school building which is a pleasure for all to work in. This atmosphere permeates everything we do and promotes a culture of high expectations. We want all school users to have high aspirations for everything they undertake in the school and by achieving success enable them to believe in themselves.

In school, the children are given plenty of opportunity to celebrate their successes in class, as well as their achievements out of school.

Our associated church is Livingstone Memorial. Outwith Covid-19 restrictions, they welcome us to use the church whenever we want to celebrate Christian festivals. We are also well supported in Religious and Moral Education by the Calderside Chaplaincy Team.

The school takes its role in the community very seriously and is pro-active in developing strong bonds with a range of individuals and groups. We work closely with several local bodies which help us to promote positive behaviour, good relationships and motivate pupils.

We feel that as a school it is important that the children realise how fortunate we all are and see that there are others who are less fortunate. Therefore, each year we support different charitable organisations, including Children in Need, The Hamilton District Foodbank and Cash for Kids.





Children's views

Here is what children from our Pupil Council think about David Livingstone Memorial Primary School:

"I think our school is lovely and very cool. I like all of the time we get to be in the play corridor." (P1 child)

"We have nice lunches. The school has lots of pictures on the walls. It's good fun doing things with my buddy. Everyone in the school is nice." (P1/2 child)

"DLMPS is fun and we get to go outside to the nice play corridor. We do a lot of learning through play in P2. I think this is good because we are having fun but still learning at the same time." (P2 child)

"The teachers look after the children and make learning fun. Everyone is friendly. If you hurt yourself, someone will take you to the office so that staff can help you." (P3 child)

"DLMPS is a good school because there are lots of things to keep you active and we have lots of competitions that you can win. You get to make lots of new friends and become more confident. Everyone is nice and friendly." (P3/4 child)

"Work is fun at DLMPS and you do things that you like all day. We have good lunches and all the children are friendly." (P4 child)

"DLMPS is good fun. We have a lot of support assistants who help us to feel happy and safe. Teachers make learning as fun as possible. Everyone is kind and they will make sure you have a friend to play with if you are new to the school." (P5 child)

"DLMPS is a really good school with really good staff members. Everyone in the school is caring. Teachers always help us and we do lots of interesting things. Children get the chance to make decisions in the school through the Pupil Council and different committees." (P5/6 child)

"We sometimes do our learning outside. We have good playground equipment. The staff and children are all nice to each other. We do lots of fun topics and the P6s get to be nursery buddies." (P6/7 child)

"DLMPS gives you a good education. You can take a box of toys outside to play with at break times. The teachers try to make learning as fun as possible, but also make sure that the lessons improve your skills and your knowledge. The staff at DLMPS are always really kind and caring, and they nurture you as well. Children get the chance to be part of a committee. This helps you to feel more confident and make decisions for the school." (P7 child)

Celebrating achievements

Children's achievements are celebrated in class and at our weekly assemblies. We also have a gallery in our school corridor which shows photographs of our wider achievements on a month to month basis. Parents/carers are encouraged to let us know about their child's achievements out of school so that these can be celebrated, too.





Each week all members of the staff in the school are encouraged to nominate children to receive a special Curriculum for Excellence award. Certificates are then awarded to children who have demonstrated that they are a successful learner, a confident individual, a responsible citizen or an effective contributor. Support staff also nominate children for an award if they have demonstrated one of our school values.

Our Rights Respecting School

David Livingstone Memorial Primary School was awarded UNICEF's Level One Rights Respecting School Award in September 2014. This prestigious award aims to develop people's knowledge and understanding of the articles contained in the United Nation Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC). It helps develop very positive behaviour in schools and allows all children to develop the 4 Capacities as outlined in Curriculum for Excellence through active, engaging and challenging lessons and activities. At the start of the session each class decides and agrees on its own Class Charter based on the articles contained in the UNCRC. We have also developed our own Lunch Hall Charter which outlines what we expect of all children and adults in our dinner hall.



Our School House System

We have a House System in the school. All the children from P1-7 are divided into one of 4 different houses: Balmoral, Bothwell, Edinburgh or Stirling. Working as a team, all of the children are trying to gain as many house points as possible in the hope that they will win a special end of term treat. P7 children are also elected as House Captains and Vice Captains.

6. The Curriculum

Curriculum for Excellence is the name given to the curriculum in Scotland for all children and young people aged 3-18. It is a forward; looking, coherent, more flexible and enriched curriculum that provides young people with opportunities to engage with the knowledge, skills and attributes they will need if they are to flourish in life, learning and work, now and in the future.

The curriculum includes all of the experiences that are planned for children and young people to support the development of their skills, wherever they are being educated, for example in the family and community, pre-school centre, nursery and school. This broad, general education will allow them to become successful learners, confident individuals, responsible citizens and effective contributors to life in the 21st century.

In taking this forward our school will work closely with South Lanarkshire Education Resources and other services to enable Curriculum for Excellence to be fully embedded, ensuring the best possible education for all children and young people. We wish you to feel confident that your child is encouraged and supported to develop their literacy, numeracy and other skills whilst they attend our school. The curriculum areas are as follows:

Spiritual, social, moral and cultural values (Religious Observance)

Spiritual, social and cultural values allow children to develop their own beliefs and learn about those of others. It allows the individual to develop an understanding of the diversity in our society and their own roles in it. Pupils will reflect and use critical thinking to enhance their understanding of beliefs.

Pre Covid-19, our school chaplains, Mr Malcolm Anderson and Mr Murdo Macdonald, visited the school each term and had input in some of our school assemblies. They also support classes with a variety of RME topics. We also make use of our local church for our Christmas Service, Easter Services and at the end of session service in June, Covid-19 permitting.

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Rights of parents / carers

Scottish Government Ministers consider that religious observance complements religious education and is an important contribution to pupils' development. It should also have a role in promoting the ethos of a school by bringing pupils together and creating a sense of community.

There is a statutory provision for parents to withdraw children from participation in religious observance. This right of parents' wishes will be respected.

Where a child is withdrawn from religious observance, schools will make suitable arrangements for the child to participate in a worthwhile alternative activity.

Parents may request that their children be permitted to be absent in order to celebrate recognised religious events. Advance notice should be provided to the school when children will be absent. Appropriate requests will be granted and the pupil noted as an authorised absentee in the register.

Equalities

Integral to this guidance is the principle of mutual respect. The diversity of belief and tradition provides an ideal context in which pupils can learn about, and so learn from, what is important in the lives of themselves and others. South Lanarkshire's guidance recognises and welcomes diversity and promotes respectful understanding.

Parents may request that their children be permitted to be absent in order to celebrate recognised religious events. Advance notice should be provided to the school when children will be absent. Appropriate requests will be granted and the pupil noted as an authorised absentee in the register.

7. Assessment and Tracking Progress

We want to share with you information on how your child's learning is progressing. Teachers carry out regular assessments on children in order to monitor their progress in all curricular areas. These assessments may be formative (informal) or summative (formal). Teachers may assess children by observing them as they complete an activity, or by asking children to complete a particular written or practical task.

Children also engage in self and peer assessment across a variety of curricular areas. In order to be able to do this effectively, staff ensure that children are made aware of the learning intentions and success criteria at the start of each lesson.

Future learning is then planned based on the results of these assessments.



8. Reporting

We will provide parents with reports so that you can see what your child is doing and how they are progressing. In addition, there will be parents' meetings which offer you the opportunity to discuss how your child's progressing and how you can contact the school if you wish further information. The school will offer you an appointment time so that you can visit in person to discuss your child's education.

Our 'learner reports' will help you to get to know more about the curriculum which each child follows and will describe their strengths, achievements and areas for development so you know what encouragement and support you can give.

We welcome any comments or additional information from parents to help us provide the best possible education for your child.



9. Transitions

Pupils normally transfer from primary to secondary school between the ages of 11½ and 12½, so that they will have the opportunity to complete at least 4 years of secondary education. Arrangements are made by the school to transfer children to the associated secondary school as determined by their home address. Parents of P7 children will be informed of the transfer arrangements made for their child to attend secondary school.

We will also provide you with information at this time and on events designed to support P7 children before they move on to secondary school.

Change of school / placing request

Normally children attend the school in their catchment area. However, there are times when parents may wish their children to go to other schools. If you wish your child to go to another school then you may make what is known as a 'placing request'. If you live in South Lanarkshire and decide to submit a 'placing request', we are unable to reserve a place in your catchment school until the Council have made a decision on the 'placing request'. Please note if your 'placing request' application is unsuccessful and all places at your catchment school are filled you will be offered a place at the next nearest appropriate South Lanarkshire School.

Please note that if an application for a 'placing request' is successful then school transport is not provided.

If you move outwith your catchment primary school a 'request to remain form' must be completed. If you move outwith your catchment primary, this may affect your right to transfer to the associated Secondary School. Please note the secondary school is determined by the pupil's permanent home address and chosen denomination. 10. Support for Pupils

Getting It Right For Every Child

Getting It Right For Every Child (GIRFEC) supports families by making sure children and young people can receive the right help, at the right time, from the right people. The aim is to help them to grow up feeling loved, safe and respected so that they can realise their full potential.

Most children and young people get all the help and support they need from their parent(s), wider family and community but sometimes, perhaps unexpectedly, they may need a bit of extra help. GIRFEC is a way for families to work in partnership with people who can support them, such as teachers.

If you have any concerns about your child's wellbeing, you can speak to the named person who will work with you to provide support and decide how to move forward. Your school will let you know who this is. It is likely to be the Head Teacher in a primary school and a principal teacher (pupil support) in Secondary.

We are committed to providing an appropriate and high quality education to all our children. We believe that all children, including those identified as having additional support needs, have a common entitlement to both a broad and balanced curriculum, which is accessible to them, and to be fully included in all aspects of school life.

We are committed to inclusion and believe that all children should be equally valued in school. We will strive to eliminate prejudice and discrimination, and to develop an environment where all children can flourish and feel safe.

South Lanarkshire Education Resources have published a series of leaflets available which cover information for parents and carers about the Additional Support for Learning Acts.

Enquire is funded by the Scottish Government to provide information on the framework for supporting children who require additional support for learning and to encourage positive partnerships between families, schools and local authorities to ensure children get the right support.

Working in partnership with parents / carers

We value the vital role that parents/carers play in a child's education and seek to work in partnership with them in order to ensure that all children have the opportunity to maximise their potential.

If your child needs extra help or support in school they can be described as having additional support needs. Children may need additional support for a short time, or a longer period and for a variety of reasons.

Should your child require additional support for a particular aspect of their learning, a meeting will be arranged with their class teacher and/or a member of the Senior Management Team to discuss our plans. This may involve some input from our visiting Specialist Support Teacher and/or an external agency such as Psychological Services, Speech and Language Therapy, Occupational Therapy or a visiting Visual/Hearing Impairment member of staff.

If your child requires an individual programme for Literacy, Numeracy or Health and Wellbeing, an Additional Support Plan (ASP) will be established. Within this, specific targets will be set for your child. These targets will be broken down into small, attainable steps so as to enable your child to achieve success. Both parents/carers and the child will be consulted in the planning and review of any ASPs. Ideas and materials for supporting learning at home will also be discussed at these meetings.

Attachment Strategy for Education Resources

Attachment – what we do to support children and young people

South Lanarkshire Council Education Resources is committed to improving outcomes for children and young people by creating emotionally supportive learning experiences in our nurseries and schools.

The Education Resources Attachment Strategy supports the action in the 'Getting It Right For Every Child in South Lanarkshire's Children Services Plan 2021-23', following the launch of the Attachment Strategy in 2020, to provide staff training in Attachment and Trauma based practice.

What does it set out to do?

The aim of the strategy is to promote better experiences of attachment for South Lanarkshire's children and young people and to ensure that all education practitioners understand the importance of attachment theory and its application and how positive relationships can make a difference to outcomes.

How can I find out more?

South Lanarkshire Council Education Resources have published a series of leaflets and posters for establishments and for parents/carers which aim to share information on attachment theory and on how this can inform the ways in which we support children and young people.

These are available in schools and on the SLC Staff Learning Sway accessible by teachers and staff.

11. School Improvement

Each year we produce a School Improvement Plan which identifies what we plan to do to improve our school over the next 12 months. Some of our improvement priorities may be in response to government guidance, whilst others will be more personally related to the needs of our own school. Staff, children and parents/carers are consulted on the contents of our Improvement Plan and we issue a summary of its contents to parents/carers at the start of each new session. This year, we have produced a Recovery School Improvement Plan to take account of the school's needs post-lockdown. A full copy of our Improvement Plan is available for any parent/carer who wishes to read this document and it is also placed on our school website.

We provide regular updates on our improvement priorities through items in the school newsletter and the Head Teacher also presents a monthly report at Parent Council meetings.

At the end of each year we review our Improvement Plan to identify the impact that the progress we have made has had on learners. Here is a summary of what we achieved during 2020/2021:

Priority 1: Promoting the positive health and wellbeing of children, parents/carers and staff

- We completed PASS assessments with all P4-7 children to help us better understand the impact of lockdown and remote learning, as well as their ability to resume school routines. We then delivered targeted interventions based on the results of these assessments.
- All staff and children completed a 'What Matters To Me' booklet to allow us to see everyone as an individual and what was important in their life.
- Staff at all levels completed Attachment Theory training delivered by SLC's Educational Psychologists.
- We shared information on SLC's Attachment Strategy with parents/carers.
- Staff at all levels received updated training on SLC's Promoting Positive Relationships and Understanding Distressed Behaviour Policy.
- All teaching staff worked in trios/quads to support one another with online learning during lockdown.
- All teachers refined their planning when schools initially returned in August 2020 to focus primarily on Literacy, Numeracy and Health and Wellbeing.
- We re-introduced 2 Nurture groups: one for our P1-3 and one for P4-7.
- All staff were trained to deliver the Emotion Works Recovery Programme and successfully implemented this in all classes. This included the introduction of an emotional check-in each morning to find out how children were feeling.
- All classes engaged in the A-Z of Resilience and completed activities linked to each letter of the alphabet. We also prepared a parent/carer leaflet with activities that families could do at home.
- We revised the 8 Wellbeing indicators (Safe, Healthy, Achieving, Nurtured, Active, Respected, Responsible, Included) with all children, focusing on a different indicator each month.
- All P1-3 children were invited to participate in the 21st Century Families Play Award.

Priority 2: Planning for equity

- Using data which showed children's level of engagement in online learning during the first lockdown, we offered additional support for identified families.
- We regularly reviewed the poverty-related attainment gap in our school and, whilst keeping within class 'bubbles', we implemented some strategies to help address this.
- We issued a range of resources, including Chromebooks, Mifi devices and stationery packs, to support children with online learning.
- We reviewed and updated our Cost of the School Day Position Statement to reflect the ongoing Covid pandemic.
- Through our monthly newsletters, we provided families with information on financial supports that were available for them to access.

Priority 3: Continuity of learning

- We made plans for a blended learning model (a mix of in-school and at home learning) for schools re-starting in August 2020, then reviewed these plans whilst still maintaining class 'bubbles' and learning 'pods' in our nursery.
- During lockdown, we introduced Google Classroom and Google Meets for all classes. We also posted up weekly activities on our nursery Learning Journals.
- We introduced 1140 hours (full-time provision) in our nursery and ensured that all 3 learning 'pods' had the opportunity to experience outdoor play every day.



During 2021/2022 our priorities for both the school and the Nursery are as follows:

Priority 1: Continuity of learning

- We will engage in Scottish Book Trust's 'Reading Schools' accreditation programme, establishing a Reading Schools Leadership Group.
- We will identify resources, as well as organise events and clubs to support reading for pleasure amongst all children.
- We will open our re-furbished school library and arrange for all classes to visit this once per week.
- We will train P7 children as Paired Readers.
- We will train P6 children as Junior Librarians.
- We will arrange visits to Blantyre Library for all classes.
- We will create a mobile playground library.
- We will provide opportunities for children to read aloud their own stories to other classes.
- We will develop an Outdoor Learning pack for P1-P7.
- We will introduce weekly outdoor learning experiences in P1-P7, making use of areas within our local community, if possible.
- We will re-introduce Forest Schools in our nursery.
- We will train a member of staff in Play Pedagogy and introduce play-based learning in P1 and P2.
- We will re-introduce Positive Play Leaders at break times.

- We will re-introduce the 21st Century Families Play Award in P1-3.
- Early Years staff will undertake training on children's speech and language development and offer support to the parents/carers of our nursery children.
- We will introduce daily storytime sessions in the nursery, with follow-up discussions.
- We will re-introduce weekly Bookbug sessions in our nursery, and provide opportunities for parents/carers to join in with these once a month.

Priority 2: Promoting the positive health and wellbeing of children, parents/carers and staff

- We will implement SLC's Attachment Strategy across our establishment.
- We will raise staff awareness of Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs).*
- We will provide increased opportunities for pupil participation in extra-curricular activities, including family learning experiences.
- We will review and update our existing Health and Wellbeing programme of study to include increased progression between stages, as well as an increased focus on mental wellbeing, pupil resilience and diversity.

Priority 3: Planning for equity

- We will train all staff in the 6 key principles of Nurture, as well as share these principles with children and parents/carers.*
- We will continue with our Nurture groups twice per week for identified pupils.
- We will continue to monitor pupil attendance and punctuality and offer support to families, as required.
- We will continue to implement targeted interventions in Literacy and Numeracy for identified children.
- We will provide resources to support home learning for identified children.
- We will introduce a weekly homework club for identified children to enhance engagement in home learning activities.

^{*}This was a priority for last session but we were unable to complete this during 2020/2021.



The use of funding to support pupil equity

As a school, we receive money from the Scottish Government in relation to the number of children who receive free school meals. This money is known as 'Pupil Equity Funding' (PEF) and this year we have been allocated £81,721. After consultation with staff, children and parents/carers when PEF was first allocated to schools, we decided to use this money to fund an additional 2 members of permanent staff, namely a class teacher and a support assistant.

This year, we have also employed a Youth Family Community Learning Officer one day a week. She works with children and families to support positive health and wellbeing, as well as to help improve pupil attendance and punctuality. In addition, we have agreed to purchase additional Numeracy and Literacy resources (including school library materials), together with new resources to support children's play and outdoor learning across the school. Other funding will be used to promote increased equity in relation to home learning, as well as to provide opportunities for family learning.

As part of participatory budgeting, we have also allowed stakeholders to take responsibility for deciding how 5% of our PEF money (£4,806) will be used. Following an extensive consultation exercise, it was agreed that this would be spent on funding external coaches to deliver extracurricular clubs, as well as to support the cost of educational excursions.



12. School Policies and Practical Information

Nursery

All children attending a local authority nursery will be provided with a free lunch. In addition, if your child attends long mornings or afternoons e.g., over 4 hours 30 minutes they will be provided with a 'brunch' or 'afternoon tea'.

Nursery lunches and snacks are based on nutritional requirements from the NHS "Setting the Table" guidance.

Nursery age children will also receive milk and a healthy snack free of charge under the Milk and Healthy Snack scheme 2021. This will be provided by the establishment

Healthy eating is something that the school supports and a range of meals are available at lunchtime that meet the Nutritional Requirements for Food and Drink in Schools (Scotland) Regulations 2020

All primary aged pupils are also offered a free breakfast within their school. The selection available includes cereal, toast, fruit and milk.

For their lunch each day pupils have the option to choose from two hot meal options, a snack option plus a vegan / vegetarian option. These are all served with vegetables or side salad. All **meals** also come with fresh chilled drinking water, salad, seasonal fruit and depending on the day - soup or a dessert.

Milk will be available for those pupils entitled to free school meals through the free school meal eligibility scheme at morning break or lunchtime

Pupils in:

- Primary 1 4 receive a free school lunch.
- Primary 5 7 meal cost is £1.95

In January 2022 Primary 5 pupils will also receive a free lunch and by August 2022 all primary school pupils will be eligible for a free lunch.

School lunches and milk can be paid for through your Parentpay account or Paypoint facilities in local shops.



Free school meals

Children of parents who receive the following benefits are entitled to a free lunchtime meal for their child:

Income Support, Universal Credit (where your take home pay is less than £610 per month),
Job Seeker's Allowance (income based), Employment and Support Allowance (income
related), Working Tax Credit and Child Tax Credit (where your gross annual income does
not exceed £7,330 as assessed by the HM Revenues and Customs), Child Tax Credit Only
(where your gross annual income does not exceed £16,105 as assessed by the HM
Revenues and Customs) or receive support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum
Act 1999.

If you are in receipt of Housing Benefit and/or Council Tax Reduction from us there is no need for you to apply online, we will use the information we hold to automatically award free school meals (P4 to S6) and/or school clothing grants (P1 to S6) to eligible families.

We would encourage parents of children who are in receipt of any of the above benefits to take up this opportunity of having a meal provided for their child when they are at school. Arrangements are in place so that children who receive free meals are not singled out and we encourage all children to remain in school at lunch time.

South Lanarkshire Council also offers a free Breakfast service. Please check with the school for details on this as timings are dependent on Covid-19 mitigations.



School uniform

We ask all parents/carers to support the school by encouraging your child(ren) to adhere to the agreed dress code and the wearing of our school uniform. The wearing of a school uniform helps promote the identity of the school in the local community and helps create an ethos of sharing and pride in the school.

In addition, the wearing of a uniform helps towards increasing the protection of all pupils. The wearing of a uniform helps staff and the pupils to distinguish between who belongs to the school and those who may be visitors. This enables staff to approach and identify visitors more readily and helps in trying to offer a safer environment for pupils and teachers alike.

Our school uniform consists of:



Blue shirt and tie

Black trousers/skirt

School sweatshirt

Equality of opportunity is an important aspect of the life of the school. Any proposals on the dress code and on what constitutes the school uniform will be the subject of discussion with the Parent Council and where appropriate consultation with parents, pupils and staff.

There are forms of dress which are unacceptable in all schools such as:

- the wearing of football colours
- clothing with slogans that may cause offence (anti-religious, symbolism or political slogans)
- clothing which advertises alcohol, tobacco or drugs
- clothing which can be deemed unsuitable in terms of health and safety grounds such as shell suits, combat style clothing, dangling earrings, loose fitting clothes particularly in practical classes
- articles of clothing that could be deemed to inflict damage on other pupils or be used by others to do so
- footwear that may damage flooring.

We also have a 'recycling rail' outside our main office. This consists of new and nearly new items of school uniform that families can take without any cost to themselves.

Allergies

A significant number of children and young people in our schools will have allergies and it is important that parents keep the school fully informed on these matters.

Allergies can present in a variety of ways and can occur at any point in a person's life. Symptoms range from mild to severe. Children and young people known to have an allergy with moderate to severe symptoms will likely have a Health Care Plan drawn up by the NHS. This will detail symptoms and appropriate interventions.

It is vital that parents share this information with the school and continue to provide any updated information.

Where symptoms are mild and a Health Care Plan is not in place, parents should still continue to liaise regularly with the school on any new triggers, medications and actions required.

In all cases, our employees need to know your child's symptoms, treatments and any actions required to help prevent exposure to the allergen and minimise the risk of allergic reactions.

Employees in schools will receive training on allergies and will liaise with parents and NHS on any additional specialist training required.

In supporting children and young people with allergies, school employees will operate in accordance with South Lanarkshire Council's Safe Systems of Work / risk assessment and national guidance on the administration of medicines.

Support for parent/carers

Clothing grant

In certain circumstances, the Council provides support to parents/carers for the purchase of school wear.

Applications can be made online at www.southlanarkshire.gov.uk. If you are required to submit evidence of your Tax Credit income it is important that a copy of this evidence is attached to your online application. Should you require further information or you are unable to submit an application online then please contact the helpline number **0303 123 1011** (option 5). Holiday dates and in–service days

A list of holiday dates is issued to all parents/carers at the start of each session. We also include important dates to remember in our monthly school newsletter.

The school holiday dates and in-service dates are available from the local authority website, www.southlanarkshire.gov.uk. In-service dates are days when staff undertake development work related to the school and children should not attend.

School holiday dates for session 2021/2022 are at the back of this handbook.



Enrolment – how to register your child for school

Annual enrolment takes place in January. Details are advertised in the local press and also at the local nurseries. Children who reach their fifth birthday between 1st March 2017 and end of February 2018 are eligible for enrolment in the Primary 1 class beginning in August 2022.

To register your child for school you should complete our online registration form. This can be done using the South Lanarkshire website.

If you have any difficulty in identifying your catchment school, please email Edsuppserv.helpline@southlanarkshire.gov.uk

The online registration form will ask you to provide each child's full birth certificate and two pieces of recent official documentation both containing your permanent home address for example a utility bill, council tax statement, housing rent card, child benefit documentation. Proof of where the child lives may also be needed.

If your child attends nursery of your catchment school don't assume that they will be automatically transferred. You must register them as normal.

If your child is starting school for the first time you must enrol your child at their catchment school in January. If parents want their child to go to another school, they must enrol in the first instance with their catchment school and ask for an information leaflet that provides details on how to make a placing request. An online placing request form is available from the SLC website – www.southlanarkshire.gov.uk or by contacting edsuppserv.helpline@southlanarkshire.gov.uk or phone **0303 123 1023**.

Enrolment date for 2022 is week commencing 17 January 2022.

P1 children will attend for a full day from Wednesday, 17 August 2022.

Transport

School transport

South Lanarkshire Council has a policy of providing school transport to primary pupils who live more than one mile by the recognised shortest walking route from their catchment school. This policy is more generous than the law requires. This means that the provision of transport could be reviewed at any time. Parents who consider they are eligible should complete a form online www.southlanarkshire.gov.uk or contact **0303 123 1023**. These forms should be completed and returned before the end of March for those pupils starting the school in August to enable the appropriate arrangements to be made. Applications may be submitted at any time throughout the year and will be considered by Education Resources.

A privilege transport scheme is operated for mainstream school contracts where a pupil is not entitled to free school transport. Privilege transport will only be granted providing there is spare capacity on an existing school contract and will be from and to designated pick up and drop off points. Privilege transport will not be provided where a service bus is used on the school run. Any spare capacity will be allocated using agreed priorities. More information on school transport is available on

Pick-up points

Where school transport is provided it may be necessary for pupils to walk a certain distance to the vehicle pick-up point. Walking distance in total, including the distance from home to the pick-up point and from the drop-off point to the school in any one direction, will not exceed the authority's distance limit for school transport.

It should be noted that it is the parent's responsibility to ensure their child behaves in a safe and acceptable manner while travelling in and alighting from the vehicle. Misbehaviour can result in your child losing the right to school transport.

Parents are asked to note that South Lanarkshire Council does not provide transport for those pupils who attend school via a placing request.

Insurance for schools - pupils' personal effects

South Lanarkshire Council is concerned at the level of claims being received for loss or damage to pupils' clothing or personal effects. Parents are asked to note the Council's position in terms of insurance for pupils' personal effects:

(i) Theft / loss of personal effects

The Council is not liable for the loss or theft of pupils' clothing or personal effects for example mobile phones, tablets etc. and any items are therefore brought into the school at the pupil/parents' own risk.

Parents can assist by ensuring that valuable items and unnecessarily expensive items of clothing are not brought to school.

Teachers and other staff have been advised not to accept custody of any such items.

The same principle applies to musical instruments and other equipment used for activities within the school, which belong to the pupil, but are brought into the school. Parents should be aware that if such equipment is left in school, it is done at the pupil/parents' own risk.

In the case of valuable items such as musical instruments, parents should ensure that these items are covered by their own household insurance.

(ii) Damage to clothing

The Council is only liable for damage caused to pupils' clothing where the damage has resulted from the negligence of the Council or one of its employees. Claims arising otherwise will not be accepted by the Council's insurers.

Family holidays during term time

Every effort should be made to ensure that your child attends school during term time. Please contact the school as soon as possible if your child is unable to attend school.

Family holidays should be avoided during term time as this both disrupts the child's education and reduces learning time. If holidays are taken during times when the school is open parents should inform the school in advance by letter.

If your child is taken on a family holiday during term time then in line with Scottish Government advice this will be classified as an unauthorised absence. However, in exceptional circumstances schools may register a family holiday during term time as an authorised absence when for example, parents are unable to obtain leave during the school holiday period.

Clearly, absence with no explanation from parents will mean that the absence will be recorded as unauthorised.

In our approach to raising attainment and achievement it is recognised that attendance at school is something that should be continuously encouraged. Parents/carers, children and the school all have a part to play in encouraging and stressing the importance of attendance at school.

Promoting positive behaviour

It is the responsibility of staff within the school to ensure that Parent Council members, parents and pupils are involved in the creation of a positive school ethos that encourages good behaviour. Equally, the school whilst trying to promote positive behaviour must support young people should incidents or bullying occur. Parents have a significant role to play in working with the school so that teachers, parents and pupils know what is expected of them in trying to change the behaviour and attitudes that contribute to bullying behaviour.

Our approach is to create an environment where better behaviour will encourage better learning. The school, along with the support of parents, can work together to create a learning environment which young people can enjoy and feel safe.

Incidents of bullying should be reported to the school immediately so that each alleged incident can be looked at. Together we can work towards creating a safer school for children and staff. In addition, a guideline (Promoting Positive Relationships and Behaviour) has been produced to support all teaching and support staff and inform them of their roles and responsibilities in respect of dealing with the small number of children and young people who display challenging behaviour. Early identification is crucial so that intervention can be provided to support children and young people to help them address their issues and concerns. Staff training is provided to help develop the skills needed to respond to and manage challenging behaviour. A wide range of appropriate staff development opportunities has been developed for this purpose.

Child Protection

All staff in educational establishments in South Lanarkshire Council are required to receive an annual Child Protection update and are required to follow the advice and guidance contained within relevant Education Operating Procedures. They must also complete a mandatory Learn on Line Course "Child Protection in Education".

South Lanarkshire's children's services partnership works together to support children, young people and their families so that children grow up in communities where they are safe, healthy, active, achieving, respected, responsible and included, and have the opportunity to achieve their full potential. They are committed to continuously improve our services to ensure children, young people and their families get the right support at the right time.

Sometimes children and young people need additional help to make sure that they are "cared for and protected from abuse and harm in a safe environment in which their rights are respected" (CPC South Lanarkshire Child Protection shared vision). The Child Protection Committee has the overarching responsibility to ensure that agencies individually and collectively work to protect children and young people as effectively as possible.

All staff have a responsibility to report any suspicions that a child has been abused or is at risk of harm, abuse, or neglect. Robust procedures and guidance are in place to support education staff to: -

- be alert to signs that a child may be experiencing risks to their wellbeing,
- report concerns to the head of establishment or the child protection coordinator without delay.
- be actively engaged in support and protection and development of wellbeing.

If you would like more information, or have a concern of a child protection nature, please contact the head of the educational establishment which your child attends.

Information on emergencies

We make every effort to ensure the school remains open during term-time for pupils. However, on occasions circumstances may arise which can affect the school. Schools may be affected by, for example, severe weather, power failures or through any other circumstances that may impact on the school day. In such cases we shall do all we can to let you know if this happens. We shall keep you in touch by telephone, text, where appropriate, letters, web news and through local radio stations particularly if there are prolonged periods of severe weather. The Council's website www.southlanarkshire.gov.uk will be used to let you know if the school is closed and when it will re-open.

It is important for parents/carers to let the school know of any change to your mobile/home telephone number and change of address.

Your commitments

We ask that you:

- support and encourage your child's learning
- respect and adhere to the schools policies and guidance
- let the school know if you change your mobile/telephone number and/or address
- enjoy and take part in school activities
- accept your responsibility to respect staff who work in the school and for the school to be proactive in taking forward its commitment to care for and educate your child.

General Data Protection Regulation as supplemented by the Data Protection Act 2018 (GDPR)

Information on pupils, parents and guardians is held by the school to enable the teaching, registration and assessment of pupils as well as associated administrative duties. The information is stored and used as per the requirements of the GDPR, with South Lanarkshire Council defined as the data controller. The Council have established a data protection policy that applies to all of its school.

Privacy Notice

Introduction

In line with the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) we have produced this privacy notice to inform you how we deal with personal information as part of our statutory function as an education authority.

The Council has a legal obligation to deliver effective education services to children, young people and adult learners in South Lanarkshire. In order to do this, we need to collect personal information about children, young people and their families so that we can help them to learn and keep them safe.

Using your personal information

The Council is a "controller" of the personal information you provide when enrolling for a nursery or school, applying for an education service or participating in groups or activities provided by Education Resources.

Information we collect from you about you and your child at enrolment

When you enrol for a nursery or school, we ask for the following information:

- parent/carer contact details (name, address, phone, email);
- the child's name, date of birth, gender and address;
- · information about medical conditions, additional support needs, religion and ethnicity;
- · any information you may wish to provide about family circumstances.

Information we collect at other times

We will also collect information at other times such as when you apply for a benefit, request a services or other support. We will provide an additional privacy notice at these times.

- · If you apply for an education service or benefit, such as school transport, free school meals, clothing grant, placing request or EMA, we will also ask for personal information as set out above. We will also ask for information about your income for education benefits applications.
- · If you make a request for additional support such as an educational psychologist or other support for learning we will ask for more detailed information to allow us to provide the most

appropriate support for your family. This may include information about family circumstances or medical conditions.

· If there are concerns about your child's wellbeing and/or your child has needs that may require additional support, we will wish to work with you to collect and consider information to enable us to help you get the right support at the right time in line with the Getting it right for every child approach.

We require this information to ensure that children and young people are educated appropriately, supported, and that we take account of their health and wellbeing. We will also ask you to update this information annually and to tell us when there are changes to your details.

Information that we collect from other sources

As an education authority and as part of our statutory function in accordance with our legal obligations, we receive information from other sources such as the SQA, the NHS or Social Work about you or your child, this includes:

- · exam results and assessment information;
- · information about health, wellbeing or child protection.

Why do we need this information?

We need this information so the Council can ensure it is delivering education services appropriately to all learners:

- · for the education of children, young people and adult learners;
- · for teaching, enrolment and assessment purposes and to monitor the educational progress of children, young people and adult learners;
- · to keep children and young people safe and provide guidance services in school;
- to identify where additional support is needed to help children, young people and adult learners with their learning;
- to maintain records of attendance, absence and behaviour of children and young people (including exclusions);
- to support children and young people moving on each year from nursery to primary, primary to secondary and when they move or leave school;
- to help us develop and improve education services provided for young people, adult learners or families
- In accordance with our legitimate interests as an education authority we will also use your information to create statistical reports.

We will share your information with:

As an education authority and as part of our statutory function in accordance with our legal obligations we will share information with other bodies or parts of the Council, including:

- The Scottish Government and bodies such as Education Scotland, Scottish Qualifications Authority, Skills Development Scotland and other organisations that support children and young people's learning;
- Other parts of the Council when required for services such as school meals, school transport, education benefits and with Social work in connection with any child protection concerns we become aware of;
- The NHS, to support health initiatives in accordance with the legal obligation on the Council in terms of section 39(3) of the National Health Service (Scotland Act 1978;
- · South Lanarkshire Leisure and Culture Limited, where children and young people are participating in sports and leisure activities;
- · Other schools/local authorities if a child moves or transfers to another school the Council has an obligation to pass on information with regards to pupil records to the new school/local authority.

You have the right to access your personal information as well as the rights of rectification, erasure, restriction and the right to object.
